

KEITH GRAMMAR SCHOOL

Introductory

Though our knowledge of the Schoolmasters of Keith goes back to 1604, the first school building of which we have authentic record, that known as the Edindaich Mortifier's School, was built in the Old Churchyard in 1648. This school and its endowment Keith owed to the generosity of Alexander Ogilvie, Writer to the Signet, Edinburgh, who, in 1647, "out of the love and affection which he had for learning and virtuous education of children within the parish of Keith, where he was born and bred," mortified the Kirk lands of Edindaich, of which he was heritable proprietor, to the Minister, Elders and Deacons of the Parish of Keith "for bigging and upholding of a School at the Parish Kirk of Keith, and for maintaining and sustaining a schoolmaster thereat, perpetually and in all time coming." This building served as the principal school of the parish for over 170 years. It appears to have had a succession of able masters and to have been looked upon as an important educational centre. Its most distinguished pupil was James Ferguson, Astronomer and Fellow of the Royal Society.

From 1819 to 1833 the upper flat of the Jail on the Square constituted the school premises, but in 1833 the Heritors built the Parish School on the site of the present buildings. Mr James Smith, M.A., who was schoolmaster from 1829 to 1866, made it one of the most notable schools in the north of Scotland, a reputation which has been well upheld since his day. Since the passing of the Education Act of 1872 the building has been extended several times, the most important extensions being effected in 1890, 1895 and 1908.

Buildings, Organisation, Curriculum

Keith Grammar School supplies elementary and secondary education not only to the towns of Keith and Fife-Keith but also to a large surrounding district.

According to the new classification of schools in the regulations of the Scotch Education Department it is a full **Secondary School** providing a complete course of elementary instruction and in addition a complete course of secondary education extending over not less than five years. The School has further been recognised by the Department as a **Centre for the Training of Junior Students**—that is, of students enrolled for the purpose of being educated and trained for the teaching profession.

For the Secondary Department a fine suite of rooms has been provided and in addition there are a spacious and fully equipped Laboratory for Physics and Chemistry, suitable for classes up to forty pupils, an Art Room with specially designed desks for Drawing, a Kitchen fully provided with appliances for the teaching of Cookery and Laundry Work, a Room suitably furnished for the instruction of girls in Housewifery, and a Workshop with carefully selected apparatus for the instruction of boys in Woodwork. An important feature of the main building is the fine School Hall capable of holding six hundred pupils and easily accessible from all parts of the building.

Libraries and Pictures.—Every class in the school is furnished with a small Library. The walls are hung with many fine pictures—from the proceeds of School Concerts and through the generosity of private donors. Contributions of books or of pictures will be very welcome.

ELEMENTARY DEPARTMENT

The organisation and curriculum of this Department are based on the requirements of the Code for Day Schools issued annually by the Scotch Education Department.

There are four divisions of this Department:-

- 1. Infant Division—Two Years' Course.
- 2. Junior Division-Three Years' Course.
- 3. Senior Division—Two Years' Course.
- 4. Supplementary Course Division—Two Years' Course.

The Subjects of Instruction in the first three Divisions are:—

Religious Knowledge, English, Writing, Arithmetic, Geography, History, Drawing and Clay Modelling, Nature Knowledge, Singing, Needlework (girls), Kindergarten (infants), Physical Exercises.

The completion of this course of study is marked by the Qualifying Examination of the Scotch Education Department. (See p. 13.)

The Supplementary Course Classes are intended solely for those pupils who, having passed the Qualifying Examination, require to leave School on attaining the age of fourteen years. All pupils who may reasonably be expected to remain at school until they attain the age of fifteen years, or to complete a three years' course of higher instruction, should enter the Secondary Department—not the Supplementary Course Classes.

Parents who wish their children to enter the Supplementary Course Classes must give written intimation of their desire to the Rector at the beginning of the Session. Pupils will not, unless for very special reasons, be transferred from the Higher Grade Department to the Supplementary Course Classes, or vice versa, in the middle of a session.

The Subjects of instruction in the Supplementary Course Division are: -

Boys and Girls—English, Writing, Arithmetic, Geography, History, Drawing
—further study and practical application of these to the
requirements of ordinary life.

Boys only—Book-keeping, Business Correspondence, Study of Newspaper Business Columns, Practical Experiments in Measurement, Woodwork, Experimental Science.

GIRLS ONLY—Household Management, including Cookery, Laundry Work, simple Dressmaking, Marketing, Keeping Accounts, Laws of Health, Care of the Home.

The satisfactory completion of this Course of Study is marked by the award of a Merit Certificate. (See p. 13.)

INTERMEDIATE DEPARTMENT

Before enrolment in this Department pupils must satisfy the Rector that they have passed or are able to pass the Qualifying Examination. They are expected not to leave School on attaining the age of fourteen years, but to pursue in earnest a course of higher instruction for at least three years. The instruction provided in this department is suited to the needs not merely of those who are preparing to enter the University and the learned professions but also of those who wish to qualify for commercial Appointments and for the higher positions in the skilled trades.

The Subjects for instruction in this course are :-

English, History, Geography, Mathematics, Experimental Science (Elementary Physics and Chemistry), Drawing, Latin, French, Singing, Physical Exercises, Cookery and Needlework (girls) or Woodwork (boys). Not all pupils take Latin.

The satisfactory completion of this Course of Study is marked by the award of the Intermediate Certificate of the Scotch Education Department. (See p.13)

SECONDARY DEPARTMENT

Before enrolment in this Department pupils must have passed the Intermediate Certificate Examination. It cannot be too clearly understood that the instruction provided in this Department is not intended solely for those preparing to enter the University or the teaching profession. It is equally necessary, and special courses are devised, for those who wish to qualify for the higher commercial appointments or for the Civil Service, or who mean afterwards to pursue their studies at some technical college or college of art.

The course of instruction extends over not less than two years and provides for advanced studies in some group of subjects selected from the following:—

English, History, Geography, Mathematics, Latin, Greek, French, German, Experimental Science, Drawing.

These subjects may be studied in any one of the following groups:-

- 1. English with History, Latin, Greek, French, Mathematics.
- 2. English with History, Latin, French, German, Mathematics.
- 3. English with History and Geography, Latin, French, Mathematics, Experimental Science.
- 4. English with History and Geography, Latin, French, Mathematics.
- 5. English with History, French, Drawing, Mathematics or Experimental Science.

Singing and Physical Exercises are included in all courses.

Special courses may be arranged by the Rector for individual pupils.

The satisfactory completion of an advanced course of study extending over not less than two years is marked by the award of the Leaving Certificate of the Scotch Education Department. (See p. 13).

Junior Students will, as a rule, follow course 3, with the addition of Drawing, Needlework (girls), Woodwork (boys), Teaching (Theory and Practice).

The three first courses are of equal value for the Aberdeen University Bursary Competition. Those who look forward to obtaining a University degree with Honours should choose one of these courses.

Term Examinations

1914—October 28th, 29th, 30th. 1915—January 27th, 28th, 29th. " May 19th, 20th, 21st.

Besides the stated Term Examinations, the dates of which are given above, occasional examinations, both oral and written, may be held by members of the Staff and by the Rector without previous notice. The results of both kinds of Examination will be reckoned in determining the position of pupils on the Prize and Merit Lists and their rate of promotion.

Holidays

Autumn Holiday—Third Monday of September.

Christmas Vacation—18th Decmeber, 1915, to 5th January, 1915 (both dates exclusive).

Easter Vacation—2nd to 12th April, 1915 (both dates inclusive).

N.B.—The dates of Examinations and of Holidays are subject to alteration.

Examinations and Certificates of the Scotch Education Department

(A) ELEMENTARY DEPARTMENT

Qualifying Examination

Passing this examination entitles a pupil to enrol in a Secondary Department or a Supplementary Course.

Merit Certificate

This certificate is granted to pupils, of not less than 14 years of age, who have diligently and successfully followed a Supplementary Course for at least one year after passing the Qualifying Examination, making not less than 90 per cent. of the possible attendances. It allows enrolment in Continuation Classes for specialised instruction.

INTERMEDIATE AND SECONDARY DEPARTMENTS

Leaving Certificate Examinations

Two group certificates are issued-the Leaving Certificate proper and the Intermediate Certificate.

Intermediate Certificate

REQUIREMENTS.—(a) Higher instruction for at least three years in a recognised school-presentation not earlier than the third year of the course: (b) satisfactory report from the teachers of the various subjects in the accepted course of study; (c) simultaneous presentation on the Lower Grade in all the subjects of the accepted course of study.

ADVANTAGES.—(a) It is a valuable certificate of ability and character, attesting the successful completion of a well-balanced course of general education; (b) it allows enrolment in the advanced classes of a secondary department; (c) it is the necessary qualification for entrance to many commercial and professional careers, for Junior Studentships, and, in the case of those who wish to qualify as Teachers of Special Subjects, for entrance to a course of professional training at a recognised Central Institution.

Leaving Certificate


REQUIREMENTS. -(a) Instruction in higher subjects for at least two years after gaining Intermediate Certificate; (b) passes at the Leaving Certificate Examinations as follows: - Three passes on the Higher Grade and one on the Lower. Of the Higher Grade passes as a rule one must be in English, one in Mathematics or Experimental Science and one in a Foreign Language.

Advantages.—(a) It is a valuable certificate of ability and character, attesting the successful completion of a full course of Secondary Education; (b) it secures exemption from many other examinations preliminary to admission to professional careers.


Examinations exemption from which is secured by passes at the Leaving Certificate Examinations

- 1. Preliminary Examination of the Scottish Universities
- 2. Law Agents' Examinations in General Knowledge
- 3. Preliminary Examination of the Pharmaceutical Society

Note.—Those who intend to qualify as Law Agents or as Pharmaceutical Chemists should on no account leave school without obtaining the Intermediate Certificate, and employers in these professions will do well to consult the Rector before employing any apprentice who has not obtained the Intermediate Certificate.

BURSARY COMPETITION—JUNE 1915

Subjects of Examination

I. English	5. Natural Philosophy,
2. Latin	including Mechanics
3. Greek	6. French

4. Mathematics 7. German

These subjects are all of equal value for the purposes of the competition, 200 marks being assigned to each. Every candidate must take English, Latin and Mathematics and two of the remaining four subjects.

This annual competition is held in June.

For full particulars regarding the examination and bursaries see the University Calendar.

Training of Teachers

Three Certificates for Teachers are now issued by the Department:-

- I. General Certificate
- II. Certificate for the Teaching of Higher Subjects
- III. Certificate for the Teaching of Special Subjects

1. General Certificate

Course of Training:-

- Junior Course at a recognised centre for the training of Junior Students, e.g., Keith Grammar School. Duration of Course—three years. Condition of Enrolment—Intermediate Certificate.
- Senior Course, at a recognised centre for the training of Senior Students, e.g., Aberdeen Training Centre. Duration of Course two, or four years. Condition of Enrolment—Junior Student's Certificate.
- N.B.—Admission to the Senior Course may be obtained by those who, without having been Junior Students, (a) have gained the Leaving Certificate; or (b) have gained the Leaving Certificate and have had the same amount of practice in teaching as Junior Students. The qualification in (a) admits only to the four years' combined Training Centre and University Course.

2. Certificate for the Teaching of Higher Subjects

COURSE OF TRAINING:-

- 1. Full Leaving Certificate Course, at a recognised Secondary School, e.g., Keith Grammar School. Duration of Course—three years. Condition of Enrolment—Intermediate Certificate.
- 2. Degree Course in Arts (Honours) or Science at a British University.

 Duration of Course—three, or four, or five years. Condition of
 Enrolment—Completion of the requirements of the University
 Preliminary Examination. This may be wholly or partly by
 passes at the Leaving Certificate Examination.
- 3. Professional Course (theoretical and practical) at a recognised centre for the training of Senior Students. Duration of Course—one year. Condition of Enrolment—Degree with Honours in the special subjects of study, or, in certain cases, Certificate of attendance and satisfactory work at Honours Classes in the special subjects of study.

N.B.—This is the course of study recommended for those who intend to qualify as Teachers of English, History, Geography, Latin, Greek, French, German, Mathematics, Science, etc., in Intermediate and Secondary Schools. Such pupils in the Keith district would naturally compete for bursaries at the Bursary Competition of Aberdeen University.

3. Certificate for the Teaching of Special Subjects

REQUIREMENTS:

- 1. Intermediate Certificate.
- 2. Course of Professional Training (theoretical and practical), with Diploma of a recognised Central Institution for the training of intending teachers of special subjects.
- N.B.—This is the course of study recommended for those who intend to qualify as teachers of Cookery, Laundry Work, Dressmaking, Household Management, Woodwork, Ironwork, Drawing, Singing, etc., in public schools recognised by the Department.

Medals, Prizes and Certificates

Dr. Grant Gold Medal to the Dux of Keith Grammar School. This medal to commemorate the work of Dr. James Grant, Rector of the School from 1873 to 1895, is awarded annually by the School Board as Managers of the Memorial Fund. The subjects in which marks are reckoned for the purpose of the award are English and Mathematics and two of the following:—Latin, Greek, French, German, Science.

The competition for this medal is open to pupils who have been in attendance at the School for not less than one session.

- Ogilvie and Ferguson Bronze Medal for Science.—This medal is awarded annually by the Managers of the Fund raised by public subscription to commemorate the genius of James Ferguson, F.R.S., the astronomer, and in grateful remembrance of Charles Ogilvie, W.S., a benefactor of the School.
- Silver Medals.—Silver Medals are awarded annually to the most distinguished pupils in some or all of the following subjects:—English, Latin, Greek, French, German, Mathematics, Science. Silver Medals are also given to best pupils in Junior School and Fife-Keith School.
- Bronze Medals.—Bronze medals are awarded annually:—(1) To the Dux of the Intermediate Division of the Secondary Department; (2) To the Dux of the Elementary Department.
- Book Prizes.—A very large number of valuable Book Prizes are awarded annually from the school funds and from the Dr. Taylor Bequest. The Book Prizes are awarded for:—Perfect Attendance, General Proficiency, Special Proficiency in Single Subjects, Meritorious Effort, Special Promotion during a Session, Special Merit in cases where pupils have to leave school before the end of a Session.

The Rector may also from time to time award Special Prizes for special reasons.

Certificates.—Pupils who have distinguished themselves, but who have not been awarded prizes, will receive Certificates of Merit.

Bursaries

(A) BURSARIES TENABLE AT KEITH GRAMMAR SCHOOL

Keith Endowment Bursaries

This endowment is of the value of £33 per annum, which will be appled in bursaries tenable at Keith Grammar School. The Endowment will in fute be administered by the Committee on Secondary Education for the County 6. Banff in terms of Section 30 of the Education (Scotland) Act, 1908. Full information regarding the Bursary Scheme may be obtained from Mr John G. Fleming, Solicitor, Keith, Clerk to the Committee.

Miss Wilson Endowment Bursaries

These Bursaries, of which at least one is available every three years, are of the value of £8 for three years. They are awarded by the Kirk Session of Keith Parish Church as Governors of the Endowment after a competitive examination held in May, and they are tenable only at Keith Grammar School. The subjects of Examination are:—Reading, Sewing, English, Mathematics (Geometry, Algebra, Arithmetic) and one foreign language. The successful candidates must be girls not less than fourteen years of age by the 1st of August of the year of examination. Full information regarding the Bursary Scheme may be obtained from Mr. Charles McGregor, Oldmore, Keith, Clerk to the Kirk Session.

Banffshire Secondary Education Committee's Bursaries

- 1. Intermediate.—These Bursaries, of which hitherto two have been available each year for the parish of Keith, are of the value of £3 for three years or thereby.
- 2. Junior Student and Secondary Bursaries.—Bursaries which hitherto have amounted to £4 or thereby are allowed by the Secondary Education Committee. These Bursaries are tenable for three years. Candidates must have obtained the Intermediate Certificate.

The above Bursaries offered by the Committee on Secondary Education for the County of Banff are tenable only at suitable schools recognised for secondary work by the Scotch Education Department, e.g., Keith Grammar School. Full information regarding the Bursary Scheme may be obtained from Mr John G. Fleming, Solicitor, Keith, Clerk to the Committee.

Aberdeen University Bursaries


A very large number of valuable bursaries are awarded annually by the University of Aberdeen after an open competition held in June each year. For the following Bursaries, tenable at Aberdeen University, the competition is restricted to candidates whose parents are resident in Banffshire:

Redhyth Bursaries, £25 annually for four years. Two of these bursaries, sometimes three, are awarded each year.

Greenskares Bursaries, £30 annually for four years. At least one of these bursaries is awarded each year.

Bursaries for Technical and Art Students

The Committee on Secondary Education for County of Banff will award such sums as they deem sufficient and the funds available will allow to aid suitable students attending an Agricultural College, a Technical College or other Central Institution or a University, whose parents or guardians require aid for the education of their children. The student must in each case follow one or other of the recognised Diploma or Graduation courses of the Institution attended.

School Regulations

Admission.—It is required by law that children shall be sent to school from the age of five to the age of fourteen years.


According to the Education Act of 1908, there must be "fixed dates" for the admission of children coming to school for the first time and for the withdrawal of children who are leaving school at the age of fourteen years. The period of compulsory school attendance is now reckoned from the first fixed date after the fifth to the first fixed date after the fourteenth birthday. The School Board of Keith has fixed the following dates for admission and withdrawal:—Ist January, Ist April, 1st August. Parents who are sending children to school for the first time should do so on the first school day after these fixed dates. Birth certificates should be sent in every case to ensure accuracy in the registration of names, dates of birth, etc. In the case of delicate children who are not sent to school until after the age fixed by the Education Acts, medical certificates should be sent to explain the delay.

Withdrawal.—Pupils must not be withdrawn from attendance at school before the first fixed date after their fourteenth birthday. Parents who intend to withdraw their children from school should in every case give written intentation of their intention to the Rector, and transference certificates, when these are required, will be furnished.

Infectious Disease.—According to the Public Health (Scotland) Act, 1897, persons who are suffering from any infectious disease, or come from a house where infectious disease exists, may not attend school. When any case of infectious disease arises, immediate notice should be sent by the parent or guardian of the pupil affected to the Rector. Pupils who have suffered from any infectious disease, or who have lived in any house where a case of infectious disease has occurred, must produce a medical certificate that they are free from infection before they can be allowed to resume attendance at school.

Register of Lodgings.—A register of lodgings is kept by the Rector, and only those lodgings that can be recommended will be allowed on the register.

Rector's Consulting Hours.—The Rector will be in his room every school day from 9 to 9.30 a.m., and every Tuesday from 4 to 5 p.m., to receive any who may desire to consult him. Interviews at other times may be arranged. The Rector will be much pleased to advise parents who desire information with regard to choice of courses, progress of pupils, etc.





Employment Bureau.—The Rector will be pleased to give information or advice to parents or pupils who desire it with regard to any form of employment for pupils of the school. Strictly confidential information will also be given to employers who desire it regarding the character and attainments of any pupils who may have applied to them for employment.

Discipline.—All pupils must be regular and punctual in attendance; in general habits orderly, neat and polite.

The Rector alone has authority from the Board to deal with cases of absence from school. To him all communications from parents should be sent.

A written excuse, dated and signed by the parent or guardian, is required in every case of absence or late arrival. When the pupil is absent beyond two days, a note of explanation is expected to be sent. In cases of continued illness a medical certificate should be procured and forwarded. Requests for leave of absence or for permission to leave school for any part of a day must be obtained beforehand and can be granted only by the Rector, to whom the request must be addressed in writing by the parent or guardian. Such requests will be granted only in cases of real necessity, where the reasons given seem to the Rector to be sufficiently important and when such absence will not seriously interfere with the instruction of the pupil.

Disorderly conduct of any kind on the way to and from school is an offence against school discipline.

The Lady Superintendent will supervise the conduct and attend to the comfort of the girls of the Secondary Department.

Fees.—No fees are charged for any classes of the school. Stationery and Readers for use in school are supplied free.

Damage.—Breakage of windows or damage to any article of school furniture must be immediately reported to the Janitor. Damage to school property—walls, windows, desks, furnishings—must be made good by the pupils in fault. Every piece of apparatus in the Science Laboratory has its proper value assigned, and all damages have to be made good.

Report Cards.—Report Cards, giving information as to conduct, attendance and the percentage of marks gained by the pupil, also the average percentage gained by the class in each subject, are issued to the pupils of the Secondary Department and to those of the Supplementary Course and Senior Divisions of the Elementary Department once in each of the three terms.

Promotion.—Pupils are promoted normally at the end of each school year, but may be promoted without being a full year in a class, whilst those who do not master the work of any class in a school year may be retained in that class till they do so.

Home Lessons.—Parents are not expected to assist pupils in the preparation of Home Lessons, but they are invited to take a sympathetic interest in the work and to see that a reasonable amount of time is devoted to it. The amount of home lessons is fixed by the capabilities of the average pupil, and parents whose children seem to have either too much or too little work to do at home should communicate with the Rector. Pupils who neglect to prepare the lessons prescribed for home work, or who for any reason have failed to grasp the instruction given, may be detained for extra instruction after school hours.

Prizes.—No prize will be awarded to any pupil whose conduct of attendance is unsatisfactory. In particular, no pupil who leaves school before the end of the session or who absents himself from the annual Prize Distribution, unless for acceptable reasons or with permission obtained beforehand from the Rector, will receive a prize. Pupils who are absent from an Examination through illness may receive an average mark at the discretion of the Rector. No prizes will be awarded in any case where the number of marks gained is an unsatisfactory proportion of the total. Pupils who have attended the school for less than two sessions, are, except in the case of the Dr Grant Gold Medal, not eligible for any of the Medals or Special Prizes. No pupil will be awarded a Medal twice for the same subject.*

Religious Instruction.—In the Senior School all classes assemble in the School Hall every morning for a short service of hymn and prayer. Regular instruction in religion and morals is also provided according to a Syllabus adopted by the School Board. Parents who wish their children to be exempted from religious instruction must give written intimation of their desire to the Rector.

School Badge.—All pupils are encouraged, and pupils of Secondary Department are expected, to wear the school cap and badge. The cap, which is to be had in two forms, suitable for girls and boys respectively, is maroon in colour. The badge, which should be worn on the cap, and may, in the case of girls, be used also as a brooch, bears the motto of the School: "Do ut Des."
