If only you could hide your face



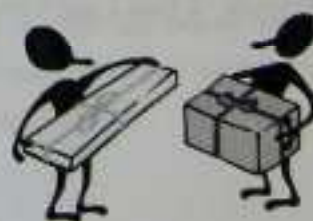
Possible Presents

Easter Enjoyment!!

As Easter is upon us, we thought we would bring you some facts, puzzles and pictures to colour to brighten up your holidays!!

- The first Easter baskets were made to look like birds' nests.
- In medieval times a festival of egg-throwing was held in church, during which the priest would throw a hard-boiled egg to one of the choir boys. It was then tossed from one choir boy to the next and whoever held the egg when the clock struck 12 was the winner and retained the egg.
- Easter is now celebrated (in the words of the Book of Common Prayer) on the first Sunday after the full moon which happens on or after March 21, the Spring Equinox.
- Americans celebrate Easter with a large Easter egg hunt on the White House Lawn.
- The date of Passover is variable as it is dependent on the phases of the moon, and thus Easter is also a movable feast.
- In Greece, people paint hard-boiled eggs red and bake them into sweet bread loaves on the Thursday before Easter. The red colour stands for the blood of Christ.
- Christians in Egypt, who are also called Copts, do not eat meat for 55 days before Easter.
- Children in Lebanon collect eggs from villages. They dye the eggs brown, green, yellow and red, and use them in egg-cracking games.
- Each year, a carnival is held in Italy. It begins in January and lasts until the start of Lent!



- Over 75 percent of Americans plan to celebrate Easter
- Easter accounts for 13 percent of the dollar volume for holiday flower sales, according to the Society of American Florists. More than 9.1 million lilies, the most popular Easter flower, were sold for the 2002 holiday.
- 42 percent of people rank the chocolate bunny as the number one "must-have" candy in an Easter basket.
- Easter is the fourth most-popular holiday for sending greeting cards, behind Christmas, Valentine's Day, and Mother's Day, according to the Greeting Card Association.
- More than 90 million chocolate bunnies, 2 million marshmallow chicks per day, and 16 billion jelly beans will be produced for Easter, according to the National Confectioners Association.
- If you laid all the eggs made on the Cadbury Creme Egg plant end to end, they would stretch 12,000 mile

Marshmallow Easter Eggs

Ingredients:

2 tbsp. gelatin
 1/2 cup cold water
 2 cups sugar
 3/4 cup hot water
 1 cup white syrup
 2 tsp. vanilla
 Cornstarch, for hands
 Milk chocolate

Instructions:

1. Mix gelatin and cold water. Set aside until water is absorbed.
2. Combine sugar, hot water, 1/2 cup of the Karo syrup and cook to the soft ball stage (240°F). Cool a few minutes.
3. Beat with mixer at full speed. Add the remaining Karo syrup and all of the gelatin mixture, 1 tablespoon at a time.
4. Beat 7 to 8 minutes after the last addition of the gelatin.
5. Add vanilla.
6. Pour into a well greased 7x9-inch pan and chill thoroughly.
7. Dust hands with cornstarch.
8. Spoon marshmallow out of pan and form eggs.
9. Brush excess cornstarch off and let dry for 1/2 hour on waxed paper.
10. Pour melted milk chocolate over eggs and let set.
11. Refrigerate for easier handling.

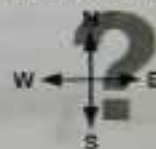
Badaguish

Last year was the first year that Keith Grammar School participated in the Badaguish Outdoor Challenge. We are aware that many of you don't know what the challenge is all about so read on and you'll find all the information that you need.

Event Objectives

The Badaguish challenge was set up to give teenagers (14 - 18 years) an opportunity to take part in a weekend challenge. The weekend involves enjoying great outdoor activities such as:

- Navigation
- Map reading
- Camping
- Environmental Aspects



Also there is the opportunity to enjoy activities such as:

- Archery
- High rope courses
- Abseiling
- Zip Wire



As the challenge is based at the Badaguish centre, those taking part in the activity get an insight into the work done here. Especially people with special needs getting to enjoy the outdoors

A minimum of £50 needs to be raised per team to take part in the challenge - Remember there's a prize for the school that raises most money!



Format:

Teams of three or four are given a pre-marked map (different each day) which includes:

- Control Points
- Route Information
- Safety Information
- Questions



Teams have to navigate themselves round the course. However, there is a time limit in which they have to be back at the camp. Time limits are achievable for all.

Prizes are awarded for:

- Finding/collecting control points
- Quickest team over two days
- Most sponsorship money pledged
- Special endeavour awards



Although there is a competitive side the event is about taking part and having fun!

Teams must have one adult supervisor who also stewards around the route.

Teams have to camp and cook for themselves. There are plenty of showers and washing facilities.


Teams enjoy various games and facilities on site and make many new friends. On Saturday night there are free activities to carry out.

Teams must bring their own equipment including:

- Camping Gear
- Food
- Drink



There is a free BBQ on Sunday afternoon and also an awards ceremony.

A couple of years ago Mr Heggie, Principal Teacher of Art and Design, began painting again. School pupils, teachers, friends and family travelled to Aberdeen Music Hall on Tuesday 8 February 2005 to give some well deserved support to this years' Rock Challengers. For those who don't know, the Rock Challenge originated in Australia in 1980 and delivers anti drug, anti alcohol and anti crime influences to teenagers by incorporating music, dance, fashion and media.

The major emphasis is on promoting healthy lives and the 'drug free high' that comes with the adrenaline rush caused by the involvement in this event. Pupils have to provide their own soundtracks, choreography, drama, costumes and set designs to produce an eight minute show without using speech.

This year, our theme was 'Lifestyles of the Rich and Famous' and focused on how celebrities influence the thoughts and actions of today's youngsters. 57 pupils in all took part ranging from dancing to lighting and make up to helping backstage, and they were under the fantastic guidance of music teacher Mrs Whitehead.



S6 pupil Lyndsey Gray co-hosted our performance, alongside Andy James of Northsound, and said: "We chose this theme as we believe that self-image and self-confidence are highly important factors in life, and also because teenagers and young adults are influenced so easily by the media. Within the story, we watch a teenager who goes to extremes, such as anorexia, to be exactly like her idol."

After their performance, Lyndsey was joined on stage by Carrie McWilliam, Sharon Henderson, Craig Barron and Julie Ettles to answer questions about their act and to hear comments from the judges.

Keith Grammar, deservedly, came home with 3 fantastic awards. They walked away with 'Best Development of a Theme' and 'Best Stage Crew' but our amazing pupils came out 3rd overall from all 11 schools taking part. These awards have left the whole school delighted and, in particular, those who took part in the competition were left over the moon with what they had achieved.

A big thank you is owed to all those who took part for putting our school firmly on the map! Well done!
