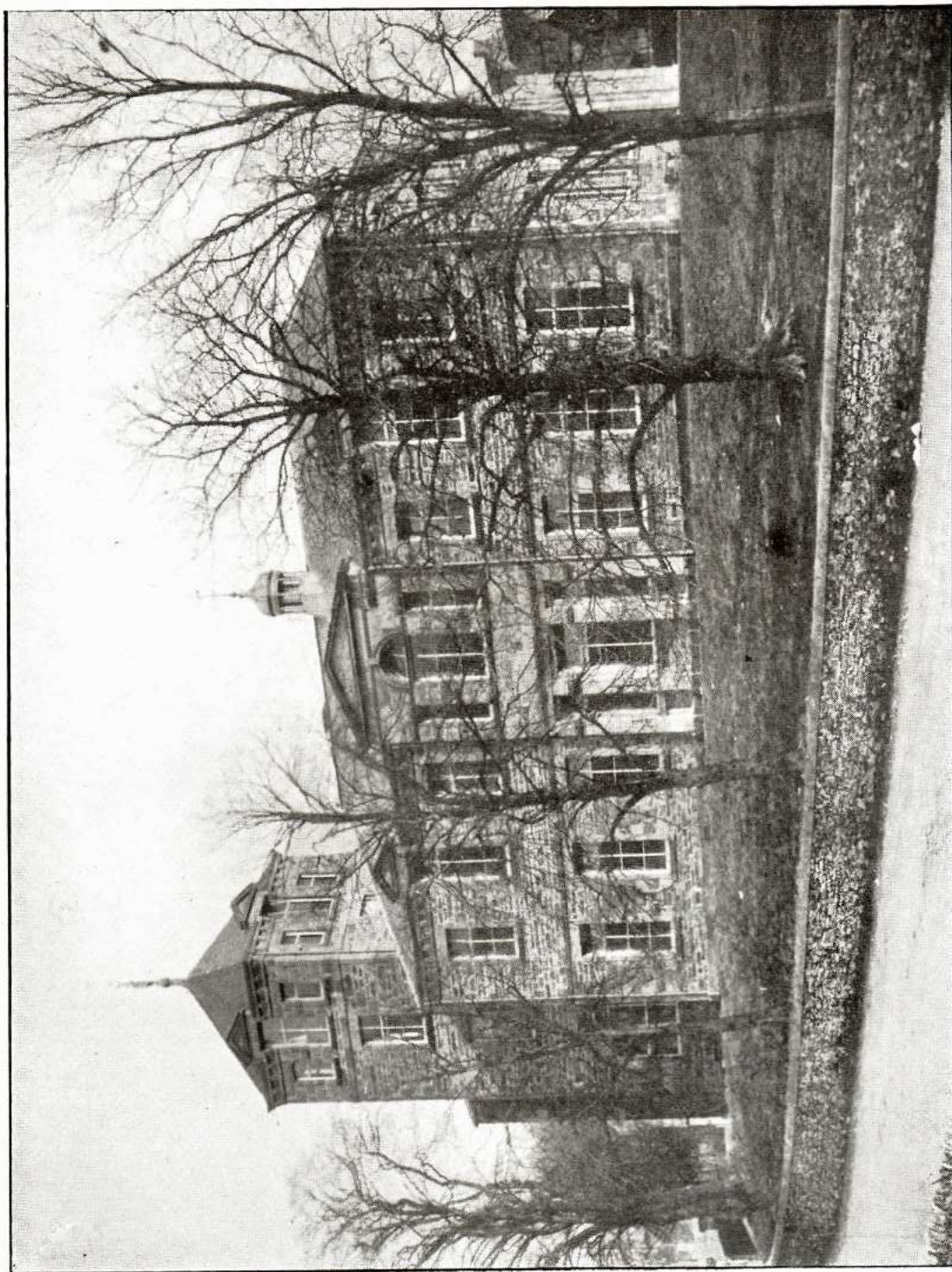

KEITH GRAMMAR SCHOOL.

Buildings, Organisation, Curriculum.

Keith Grammar School supplies elementary and secondary education not only to the towns of Keith and Fife-Keith but also to a large surrounding district.

According to the new classification of schools in the regulations of the Scotch Education Department it is a full **Secondary School** providing a complete course of elementary instruction and in addition a complete course of secondary education extending over not less than five years. The school has further been recognised by the Department as a **Centre for the Training of Junior Students**—that is, of students enrolled for the purpose of being educated and trained for the teaching profession.

For the Secondary Department a fine suite of new rooms has been provided, and in addition there are a spacious and fully equipped Laboratory for Physics and Chemistry, suitable for classes up to forty pupils, an Art Room with specially designed desks for Drawing, a Kitchen fully provided with appliances for the teaching of Cookery and Laundry Work, a Room suitably furnished for the instruction of girls in Housewifery, and a Workshop with carefully selected apparatus for the instruction of boys in Woodwork. The leading feature of the recent extensions is the fine School Hall capable of holding six hundred pupils and easily accessible from all parts of the building.

ELEMENTARY DEPARTMENT.

The organisation and curriculum of this Department are based on the requirements of the Code for Day Schools issued annually by the Scotch Education Department.

There are four divisions of this Department :—

1. Infant Division—Two Years' Course.
2. Junior Division—Three Years' Course.
3. Senior Division—Two Years' Course.
4. Supplementary Course Division—Two Years' Course.

The Subjects of Instruction in the first three Divisions are :—

Religious Knowledge, English, Writing, Arithmetic, Geography, History, Drawing and Modelling, Nature Knowledge, Singing, Needlework (girls), Kindergarten (infants), Physical Exercises.

The completion of this course of study is followed by the Qualifying Examination of the Scotch Education Department. (See p. 12).

The Supplementary Course classes are intended solely for those pupils who, having passed the Qualifying Examination, require to leave school on attaining the age of fourteen years. All pupils who may reasonably be expected to remain at school until they attain the age of fifteen years or to complete a three years' course of higher instruction, should enter the Secondary Department—not the Supplementary Course Classes.

Parents who wish their children to enter the Supplementary Course Classes must give written intimation of their desire to the Rector at the beginning of the Session. Pupils will not, unless for very special reasons, be transferred from the Higher Grade Department to the Supplementary Course Classes, or *vice versa*, in the middle of a session.

The Subjects of Instruction in the Supplementary Course Division are:—
BOYS AND GIRLS—English, Writing, Arithmetic, Geography, History, Drawing—
Further study and practical application of these to the requirements of ordinary life.

BOYS ONLY—Book-keeping, Business Correspondence, Study of Newspaper Business Columns, Practical Experiments in Measurement, Woodwork.

GIRLS ONLY—Household Management, including Cookery, Laundry Work, simple Dressmaking, Marketing, Keeping Accounts, Laws of Health, Care of the Home.

The satisfactory completion of this Course of Study is followed by the award of a Merit Certificate. (See p. 12).

INTERMEDIATE DEPARTMENT.

Before enrolment in this Department pupils must satisfy the Rector that they have passed or are able to pass the Qualifying Examination. They are expected not to leave school on attaining the age of fourteen years, but to pursue in earnest a course of higher instruction for at least three years. The instruction provided in this department is not merely suited to the needs of those who are preparing to enter the University and the learned professions, but is essential for all who wish to qualify for commercial appointments and for the higher positions in the skilled trades.

The Subjects of Instruction for this Course are:—

ENGLISH (Literature, Paraphrasing, Composition, Grammar, Repetition), HISTORY (British, especially Scottish), GEOGRAPHY (The World generally, Physical, Commercial, Reading of Contour Maps), MATHEMATICS (Arithmetic, Geometry, Mensuration, Algebra), EXPERIMENTAL SCIENCE (Elementary

Physics and Chemistry), DRAWING, LATIN (Translation, Composition, Grammar, History), FRENCH (Translation, Composition, Grammar, Conversation), SINGING, PHYSICAL EXERCISES, NEEDLEWORK (girls), or WOODWORK (boys).

The satisfactory completion of this course of study is followed by the award of the Intermediate Certificate of the Scotch Education Department. (See p. 15).

SECONDARY DEPARTMENT.

Before enrolment in this Department pupils must satisfy the Rector that they have passed the Intermediate Certificate Examination. It cannot be too clearly understood that the instruction provided in this department is not intended solely for those preparing to enter the University or the teaching profession. It is equally necessary, and special courses are devised, for those who wish to qualify for the higher commercial appointments or who mean afterwards to pursue their studies at some technical college or college of art.

The course of instruction extends over not less than two years, and provides for advanced study in some group of subjects selected from the following:—

ENGLISH (History of the Language and Literature, Criticism, Literature, Composition, Old and Middle English).

HISTORY (British and European).

GEOGRAPHY (Physical, Historical, Commercial, and Political, Reading and Construction of Contour and Ordnance Survey Maps).

MATHEMATICS (Geometry, Algebra, Trigonometry, Arithmetic, Analytical Conics).

LATIN (Translation, Composition, Grammar, History, Antiquities, Mythology).

GREEK (Translation, Composition, Grammar, History).

FRENCH (Translation, Literature, Composition, Grammar, History, Conversation).

GERMAN (Translation, Literature, Composition, Grammar, History, Conversation).

EXPERIMENTAL SCIENCE (Inorganic Chemistry, Optics, Mechanics).

DRAWING (Applied Design, Illumination, Illustration, Nature Studies, Sketching from Nature, Studies of Interiors and of Still Life).

These subjects may be studied in any of the following groups:—

Group A.—English with History and Geography, Latin, Greek, Mathematics.
Suitable for the following professions:—The Church, Law, Medicine, Teaching.

Group B.—English with History and Geography, French, German, Mathematics.
Suitable for the following professions:—Commerce, Teaching.

Group C.—English with History and Geography, Latin, French, Mathematics.
Suitable for the following professions:—Law, Medicine, Teaching.

Group D.—English with History and Geography, French or German, Mathematics, Experimental Science. Suitable for the following professions:—Engineering, Agriculture, Teaching.

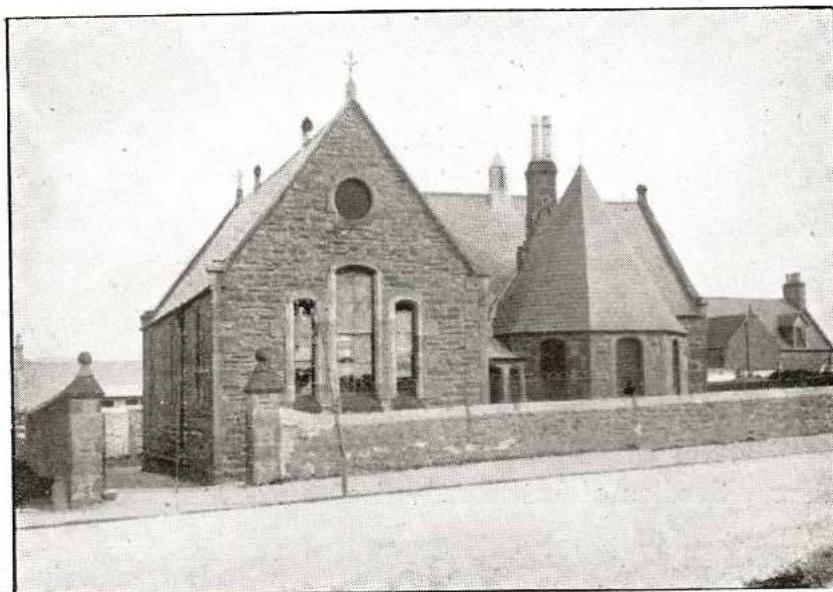
Group E.—English with History and Geography, French or German, Experimental Science, Drawing. Suitable for the following professions:—Medicine, Engineering, Agriculture, Architecture, Teaching.

Special groups may be arranged to suit the needs of individual pupils. For these application must be made to the Rector.

The first four groups are of equal value for the purposes of the Bursary Competition of Aberdeen University. (See p. 17). Pupils of superior ability who may look forward to obtaining a University degree with Honours should choose one of these groups.

Those who wish to qualify as Teachers of Higher Subjects in Secondary Schools should select one of these groups, with a view to obtaining an Honours Degree:—

For Intending Teachers of Classics	Group A.
For Intending Teachers of English	Group A or C.
For Intending Teachers of Modern Languages	Group B.
For Intending Teachers of Mathematics or Science	Group D.
For Intending Teachers of Art	Group E.



FIFE-KEITH SCHOOL.

SPECIAL COURSE FOR JUNIOR STUDENTS.

This course is recommended for those pupils who are preparing for admission to any of the Training Centres for Teachers with a view to qualifying as certificated teachers in public elementary schools.

It includes English, Geography, History, Mathematics, Latin, French, Experimental Science, and Drawing; also:—SINGING (Theory and Practice, Staff and Sol-Fa Notations), NEEDLEWORK (girls) or WOODWORK (boys), PHYSICAL EXERCISES, TEACHING (Demonstration lessons, Theory of School Management, Practice in Class Teaching).

The satisfactory completion of an advanced course of study extending over not less than two years is followed by the award of the Leaving Certificate of the Scotch Education Department. (See p. 15).

Examinations and Certificates of the Scotch Education Department.

(A). ELEMENTARY DEPARTMENT.

Qualifying Examination.

REQUIREMENTS.—(a) Satisfactory Report from the Rector and the Class Teacher, on completing the course of instruction of the Elementary Department; (b) Examination, when called upon by H.M. Inspector, in any or all of the subjects studied.

ADVANTAGES.—(a) It allows enrolment in a Secondary Department or Supplementary Course; (b) It is a necessary condition of obtaining the Merit Certificate.

Merit Certificate.

REQUIREMENTS.—(a) Age not less than 14 years; (b) Pass at the Qualifying Examination; (c) At least one year of serious study after passing the Qualifying Examination—a daily record of work to be kept by the pupil; (d) Good character and conduct.

ADVANTAGES.—(a) Certificate of ability and character; (b) It allows enrolment in Continuation Classes for specialised instruction.

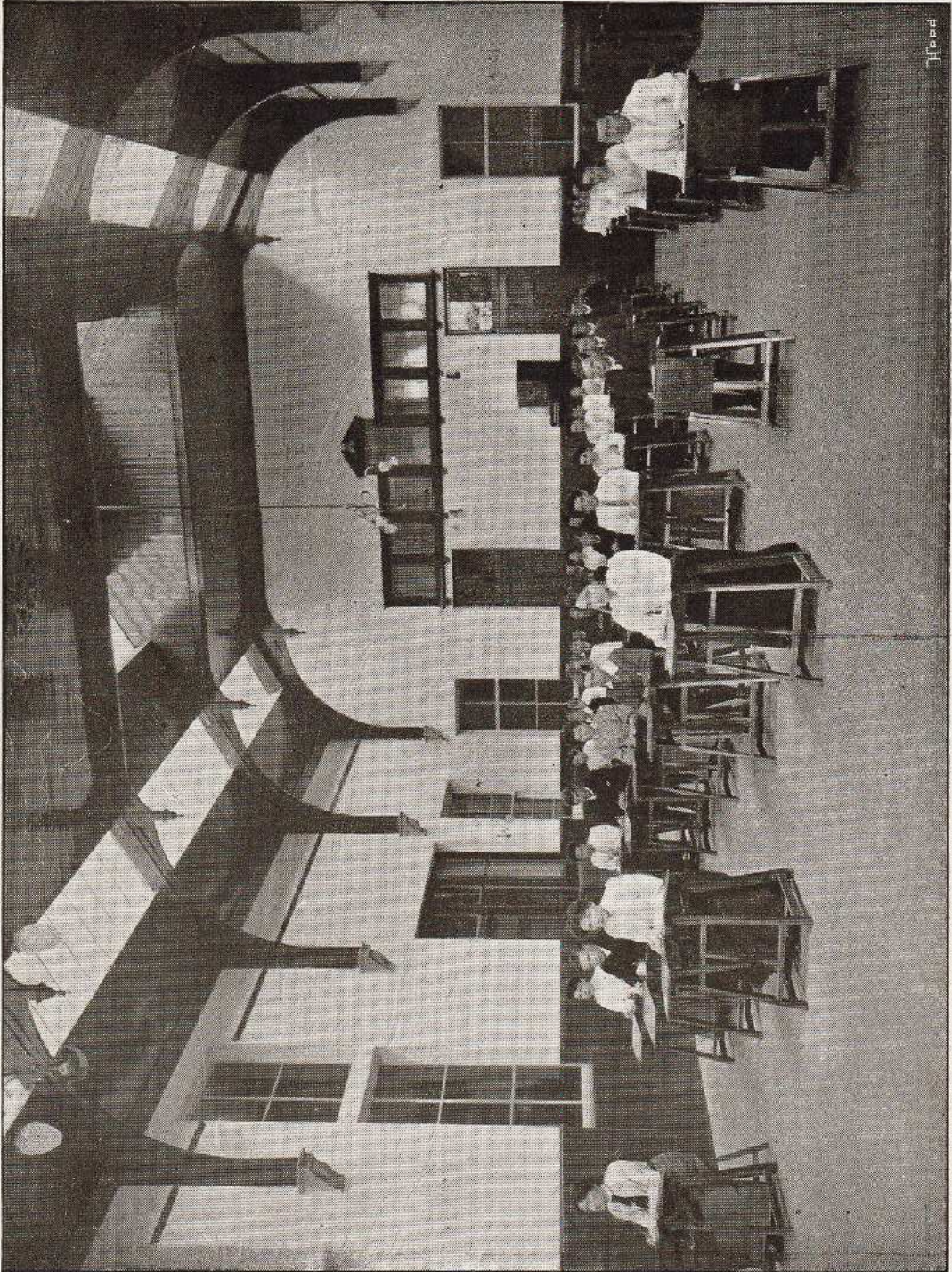

EXPERIMENTAL SCIENCE.

DRAWING.

The examination is held in two Grades, Higher and Lower. In all cases a pass in the Higher Grade is held to cover a pass in the Lower Grade of the same subject.

Documents are issued in attestation of Higher Grade, but not of Lower Grade, passes. Should any candidate desire to utilise a pass obtained at the Leaving Certificate Examinations in order to secure exemption from some other examination, it will be necessary for him or her to prefer a request in writing to the Department, and the information will be forwarded direct to the examining body in question.



SCHOOL HALL.

Group Certificates.

There are two Group Certificates issued—the Leaving Certificate proper and the Intermediate Certificate.

Leaving Certificate.

REQUIREMENTS.—(a) Higher instruction for at least four years in a recognised school; (b) Passes at the Leaving Certificate Examinations as follows:—(1) English (Higher only); (2) Mathematics; (3) Latin or Experimental Science, or both; (4) French, German, Greek, or Drawing—in all, four Higher or three Higher and two Lower passes.

ADVANTAGES.—(a) It is a valuable certificate of ability and character, attesting the successful completion of a full course of Secondary Education; (b) It secures exemption from many other examinations preliminary to admission to professional careers.

Note.—The requirements for the Group Leaving Certificate are at present under revision by the Education Department.

Intermediate Certificate.

REQUIREMENTS.—(a) Higher instruction for at least three years in a recognised school—presentation not earlier than the third year of the course; (b) Satisfactory report from the teachers of the various subjects in the accepted course of study; (c) Simultaneous presentation on the Lower Grade in all the subjects of the accepted course of study.

ADVANTAGES.—(a) It is a valuable certificate of ability and character, attesting the successful completion of a well-balanced course of general education; (b) It allows enrolment in the advanced classes of a secondary department; (c) It is the necessary qualification for entrance to many commercial and professional careers, also for junior students and others who wish to obtain appointments as teachers in elementary schools, or as teachers of special subjects (see p. 18) in schools of any kind recognised by the Department.

EXEMPTIONS FROM OTHER EXAMINATIONS SECURED BY PASSES AT THE LEAVING CERTIFICATE EXAMINATIONS.

1. Preliminary Examination of the Scottish Universities.

- (a) *Higher Grade* Leaving Certificate passes in *English, Latin, Greek, French, German, Mathematics, and Dynamics* are accepted as equivalent to *Higher Grade* passes in these subjects at the University Preliminary Examinations in *Arts, Science, and Medicine*.

- (b) *Lower Grade Leaving Certificate* passes in *Latin, Greek, and Mathematics* are accepted as equivalent to the *Lower Grade* passes in these subjects at the *University Preliminary Examinations in Arts and Science*.
- (c) *Lower Grade Leaving Certificate* passes in *English, Latin, Greek, French, German, and Mathematics* are accepted as equivalent to *Lower Grade* passes in these subjects at the *University Preliminary Examination in Medicine*, provided that the examinations in all the requisite subjects have been passed at one or not more than two examinations.

Note.—For the exact requirements of the *University Preliminary Examinations* in *Arts, Science, and Medicine*, and for the conditions of grants from the *Carnegie Trust*, see the *University Calendar*.

2. Law Agents' Examinations in General Knowledge.

- (a) The *Intermediate Certificate* or *Lower Grade Leaving Certificate* passes in *English, Latin, and Mathematics* are accepted as equivalent to the *First Examination in General Knowledge*.
- (b) The *Leaving Certificate* or *Higher Grade Leaving Certificate* passes in any three of the following:—*Mathematics, Latin, Greek, French, German*—together with a pass in *Book-keeping*—are accepted as equivalent to the *Second Examination in General Knowledge*.

3. Preliminary Examination of the Pharmaceutical Society.

Lower Grade Leaving Certificate passes in *English, Latin, Mathematics, and French* or *German* are accepted in lieu of this examination, provided that these are obtained at one or not more than two examinations.

Note.—Those who intend to qualify as *Law Agents* or as *Pharmaceutical Chemists* should on no account leave school without obtaining the *Intermediate Certificate*, and employers in these professions will do well to consult the *Rector* before employing any apprentice who has not obtained the *Intermediate Certificate*.

These subjects are all of equal value for the purposes of the competition, 200 marks being assigned to each. Candidates may select not more than four subjects, at least two of these being from the first five subjects on the above list.

The date of this annual competition has now been altered from April to June of each year, and the competition for 1911 will commence on 20th June.

Training of Teachers.

Three Certificates for Teachers are now issued by the Department:—

- I. General Certificate.
- II. Certificate for the Teaching of Higher Subjects.
- III. Certificate for the Teaching of Special Subjects.

1. General Certificate.

COURSE OF TRAINING:—

1. Junior Course, at a recognised centre for the training of Junior Students, *e.g.*, Keith Grammar School. Duration of Course—two, or three, years. Condition of Enrolment—Intermediate Certificate.
2. Senior Course, at a recognised centre for the training of Senior Students, *e.g.*, Aberdeen Training Centre. Duration of Course—two, or three, years. Condition of Enrolment—Junior Student's Certificate.

This course includes attendance at University Classes in those subjects that bear on the work of a public school. It should, wherever possible, be pursued for three years, and made to include the M.A. degree.

N.B.—This is the course of study recommended for those who intend to qualify as teachers in Elementary Schools, also for those who look forward to being appointed as Head Teachers of any kind of public schools.

2. Certificate for the Teaching of Higher Subjects.

COURSE OF TRAINING:—

1. Full Leaving Certificate Course, at a recognised Secondary School, *e.g.*, Keith Grammar School. Duration of Course—two, or three, years. Condition of Enrolment—Intermediate Certificate.
2. Degree Course in Arts (Honours) or Science, at a British University. Duration of Course—three, or four, or five, years. Condition of Enrolment—Completion of the requirements of the University Preliminary Examination. This may be wholly or partly by passes at the Leaving Certificate Examination.
3. Professional Course (theoretical and practical), at a recognised centre for the training of Senior Students. Duration of Course—six months. Condition of Enrolment—Degree with Honours (1st or 2nd Class) in the special subjects of study, or, in certain cases, Certificate of attendance and satisfactory work at Honours Classes in the special subjects of study.

N.B.—This is the course of study recommended for those who intend to qualify as Teachers of English, History, Geography, Latin, Greek, French, German, Mathematics, Science, etc., in Intermediate and Secondary Schools. Such pupils in the Keith district would naturally compete for bursaries at the Bursary Competition of Aberdeen University.

3. Certificate for the Teaching of Special Subjects.

REQUIREMENTS:—

1. Intermediate Certificate.
2. Course of Professional Training (theoretical and practical), with Diploma of a recognised Central Institution for the training of intending teachers of special subjects.

N.B.—This is the course of study recommended for those who intend to qualify as Teachers of Cookery, Laundry Work, Dressmaking, Household Management, Woodwork, Ironwork, Drawing, Singing, etc., in public schools recognised by the Department.

Medals, Prizes, and Certificates.

Dr. Grant Gold Medal to the Dux of Keith Grammar School.—This medal, to commemorate the work of Dr. James Grant, Rector of the School from 1873 to 1895, is awarded annually by the School Board as Managers of the Memorial Fund. The subjects in which the marks are reckoned for the purpose of the award are English, Mathematics, Latin, French, and one

of the following:—Science, Greek, German. The competition for this medal is open to pupils who have been in attendance at the School for not less than one session.

Ogilvie and Ferguson Bronze Medal for Science.—This medal is awarded annually by the Managers of the Fund raised by public subscription to commemorate the genius of James Ferguson, F.R.S., the astronomer, and in grateful remembrance of Alexander Ogilvie, W.S., a benefactor of the School.

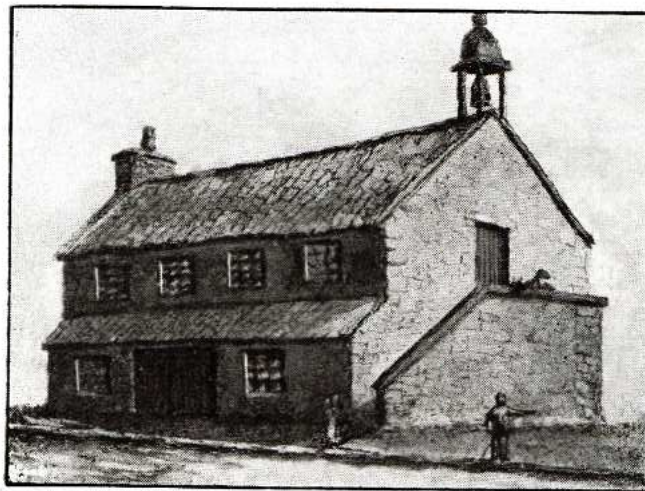
Silver Medals.—Silver medals are awarded annually to the most distinguished pupils in the following subjects:—ENGLISH, LATIN, GREEK, FRENCH, GERMAN, MATHEMATICS, SCIENCE.

Bronze Medals.—Bronze medals are awarded annually:—(1) To the Dux of the Intermediate Division of the Secondary Department; (2) To the Dux of the Elementary Department.

Book Prizes.—A very large number of valuable Book Prizes are awarded annually from the school funds and from the Dr. Taylor Bequest. The Book Prizes are awarded for:—Perfect Attendance, General Proficiency, Special Proficiency in Single Subjects, Meritorious Effort, Special Promotion during a Session, Special Merit in cases where pupils have to leave school before the end of a Session.

The Rector may also from time to time award Special Prizes for special reasons, whenever he thinks it right and advisable to do so.

Certificates.—Pupils who have distinguished themselves, but who have not been awarded prizes, will receive Certificates of Merit.

Bursaries.

(A). BURSARIES TENABLE AT KEITH GRAMMAR SCHOOL.

Keith Endowment Bursaries.

This Endowment is of the value of £33 per annum, which will be applied in bursaries tenable at Keith Grammar School. The Endowment will in future be administered by the Committee on Secondary Education for the County of Banff in terms of Section 30 of the Education (Scotland) Act, 1908. Full information regarding the Bursary Scheme may be obtained from Mr. John G. Fleming, Solicitor, Keith, Clerk to the Committee.

Miss Wilson Endowment Bursaries.

These Bursaries, of which one is available every three years, are of the value of £8 for three years. They are awarded by the Kirk Session of Keith Parish Church as Governors of the Endowment, after a competitive examination held in May each year, and they are tenable only at Keith Grammar School. The subjects of examination are:—Reading, Sewing, English, Mathematics (Geometry, Algebra, Arithmetic), Latin, and French. The successful candidates must be girls not less than 14 years of age by the 1st of August of the year of examination. Full information regarding the Bursary Scheme may be obtained from Mr. Charles McGregor, Oldmore Lodge, Keith, Clerk to the Kirk Session.

Banffshire Secondary Education Committee's Bursaries.

1. Intermediate.—These Bursaries, of which hitherto two have been available each year for the Parish of Keith, are of the value of £3 for three years. In addition, certain allowances may be granted towards maintenance and the payment of travelling expenses.

2. Junior Student.—These Bursaries, of which seventeen are available this year, are for three years, and are of the value of £5 per annum. In addition, certain allowances may be granted towards maintenance and the payment of travelling expenses. They are awarded to those who qualify as Junior Students, who therefore have previously obtained the Intermediate Certificate of the Scotch Education Department.

3. Secondary.—These Bursaries, of which eight—four for boys and four for girls—are available this year, are for three years, and are of the value of £5 per annum. In addition, allowances may be granted towards maintenance and the payment of travelling expenses. They are awarded only to those who have previously obtained the Intermediate Certificate of the Scotch Education Department.

The above Bursaries offered by the Committee on Secondary Education for the County of Banff are tenable only at suitable schools recognised for secondary

work by the Scotch Education Department—*e.g.*, Keith Grammar School. Full information regarding the Bursary Scheme may be obtained from Mr. John G. Fleming, Solicitor, Keith, Clerk to the Committee.

(B). BURSARIES OPEN FOR COMPETITION TO PUPILS OF KEITH GRAMMAR SCHOOL.

Aberdeen University Bursaries.

A very large number of valuable Bursaries are awarded annually by the University of Aberdeen after an open competition held in June each year. For the following Bursaries, tenable at Aberdeen University, the competition is restricted to candidates whose parents are resident in Banffshire:—

Redhyth Bursaries, £25 annually for four years. Two of these bursaries, sometimes three, are awarded each year.

Greenskars Bursaries, £30 annually for four years. At least one of these bursaries is awarded each year.

Bursaries for Technical and Art Students.

The Committee on Secondary Education for the County of Banff reserve a sum not exceeding £50 to aid suitable students attending an Agricultural College, and a sum not exceeding £100 to aid suitable students attending a Technical College or other Central Institution (as for Cookery, Laundry Work, Dairying, Art, etc.), or a University or a Training Centre for Teachers, whose parents or guardians require aid for the education of their children. Full information regarding these Bursaries may be obtained from Mr. John G. Fleming, Solicitor, Keith, Clerk to the Committee.



PARISH SCHOOL.

School Regulations.

The attention of Parents and Guardians is particularly requested to the following Regulations, which have been carefully drawn up to secure smooth and efficient working. The whole community is directly interested in the welfare of the School, and all are invited to co-operate heartily with the School Board, the Rector, and the School Staff in carrying out the regulations.

Admission.—It is required by law that children shall be sent to school from the age of five to the age of fourteen years.

According to the Education Act of 1908, there must be “fixed dates” for the admission of children coming to school for the first time and for the withdrawal of children who are leaving school at the age of fourteen years. The period of compulsory school attendance is now reckoned from the first fixed date after the fifth to the first fixed date after the fourteenth birthday.

The School Board of Keith has fixed the following dates for admission and withdrawal:—1st January, 1st April, 1st August. Parents who are sending children to school for the first time should do so on the first school day after these fixed dates. Birth certificates should be sent in every case to ensure accuracy in the registration of names, dates of birth, etc. In the case of delicate children who are not sent to school until after the age fixed by the Education Acts, medical certificates should be sent to explain the delay.

Pupils from other Schools.—Children who are being transferred from other schools for proper reasons are admitted at any time. These should present transference certificates from the head teachers of the schools which they last attended, giving particulars as to age, standard of attainment, record of attendance, reason for transference, etc.

Pupils coming to Keith Grammar School from other schools receive every attention. In those cases where a new pupil is behind the standard of his class in one or more subjects, special instruction is given him to enable him to overtake the work of the class satisfactorily.

Pupils from other Parishes.—Pupils who require to leave by train before the end of the afternoon session are allowed to go when it is necessary, and those whose trains are later receive every facility for the preparation of their lessons in school.

Register of Lodgings.—A register of lodgings will be kept by the Rector, and only those lodgings that can be recommended will be allowed on the register.

Intending Junior Students.—The attention of those who look forward to becoming Junior Students is invited to the exceptional advantages for training which Keith Grammar School offers by reason of its large staff of highly qualified teachers of advanced subjects, its new and complete class rooms and laboratories, and the large elementary department available as a practising school. Special instruction in School Management is given under the supervision of the Rector, who is Master of Method.

Withdrawal.—Pupils must not be withdrawn from attendance at school before the first fixed date after their fourteenth birthday. Parents who intend to withdraw their children from school should in every case give written intimation of their intention to the Rector, and transference certificates, when these are required, will be furnished.

Pupils leaving school are expected in every case to call on the Rector in his room to say good-bye to him, and are also expected to say good-bye to their class teachers.

Rector's Consulting Hours.—The Rector will be in his room every school day from 9 to 9.30 a.m., also every Tuesday from 4 to 5 p.m., to receive any who may desire to consult him. Interviews at other times may be arranged. The Rector will be very pleased to advise parents who desire information with regard to choice of courses, progress of pupils, etc.

Employment Bureau.—The Rector will be pleased to give information or advice to parents or pupils who desire it with regard to any form of employment for pupils of the school. Strictly confidential information will also be given to employers who desire it regarding the character and attainments of any pupils who may have applied to them for employment.

Discipline.—All pupils must be in attendance regular and punctual, in general habits orderly, neat, and polite.

“Bring up the children in habits of punctuality, of good manners and language, of cleanliness and neatness; impress upon them the importance of cheerful obedience to duty, of consideration and respect for others, and of honour and truthfulness in word and act.” (Extract from the Code.)

Regular inspection is made of the pupils of the Elementary Department, to train them into habits of personal cleanliness.

The Rector alone has authority from the Board to deal with cases of absence from school. To him all communications from parents should be sent.

A written excuse, dated and signed by the parent or guardian, is required in every case of absence or late arrival. When the pupil is absent beyond two days a note of explanation is expected to be sent. In cases of continued illness a medical certificate should be procured and forwarded.

No excuse except illness or bereavement is regarded as satisfactory for

absence or neglect of lessons, unless permission has been previously granted. Requests for leave of absence or for permission to leave school for any part of a day must be obtained beforehand, and can be granted only by the Rector, to whom the request must be addressed in writing by the parent or guardian. Such requests will be granted only in cases of real necessity, where the reasons given seem to the Rector to be sufficiently important, and when such absence will not seriously interfere with the instruction of the pupil. Pupils are particularly warned not to absent themselves from any class without permission.

Disorderly conduct of any kind on the way to and from school is an offence against school discipline.

Smoking by school pupils is strictly prohibited, and offenders will be severely punished.

Pupils on probation for misconduct, idleness, etc., will present to the Rector every week, for at least six weeks, a written report from each of their teachers. This report will be initialed by the Rector, and must be returned to him signed by the parents or guardians.

The Lady Superintendents will supervise the conduct and attend to the comfort of the girls of the Secondary Department.

Fees.—No fees are charged for any classes of the school. Stationery and Readers for use in school are supplied free.

Damage.—Breakage of windows or damage to any article of school furniture must be immediately reported to the Janitor. No punishment is inflicted unless the damage is the result of gross carelessness or wilful misconduct, but damage to school property—walls, windows, desks, furnishings—must be made good by the pupils in fault. Every piece of apparatus in the Science Laboratory has its proper value assigned, and all damages have to be made good.

Infectious Disease.—According to the Public Health (Scotland) Act, 1897, persons who are suffering from any infectious disease, or who have come from a house where infectious disease exists, may not attend school. When any case of infectious disease arises, immediate notice should be sent by parents of pupils to the Rector. Pupils who have suffered from any infectious disease, or who have lived in any house where a case of infectious disease has occurred, must produce a medical certificate that they are free from infection before they can be allowed to resume attendance at school.

Examinations.—The results of the Public Examinations are not, as a rule, taken into account in the award of school prizes and certificates.

Class examinations, both oral and written, are held regularly by the various teachers, and at intervals by the Rector, and it is the results of these examinations that determine the position of pupils on the Prize and Merit Lists and their rate of promotion.

Report Cards.—Report Cards, giving full information as to conduct, attendance, and the percentage of marks gained by the pupil, also the average percentage gained by the class in each subject, are issued to the pupils of the Secondary Department and to those of the Supplementary Course and Senior Divisions of the Elementary Department as soon as possible after the expiry of each term. The terms end on the last Friday of November and of March and on the last day of the session.

Promotion.—Promotion is regulated entirely by the attainments of the pupils, tested by the class examinations and judged by the Rector in consultation with the class teachers. Parents would do well to remember that, while ill-health and lack of ability are to a less extent under control, the chief causes of slow promotion are quite unnecessary, and can with proper care be eliminated. These are:—Delay in sending the child to school on attaining the proper age, irregular attendance, neglect of home lessons, lack of home encouragement and discipline, and delay in sending the child for secondary education to a properly staffed recognised centre for such instruction.

Home Lessons.—Home Lessons are necessary in the Elementary Department to give the child practice in the work taught during school hours. No home lessons are prescribed in this Department except on work previously explained, and in most of the Junior Classes the actual home lessons are gone over carefully in school before the classes are dismissed. Parents are not expected to assist pupils in the preparation of home lessons, but they are invited to take a sympathetic interest in the work being done.

In the Secondary Department, where pupils are preparing in earnest for their after career, home study is even more important, and parents are invited to co-operate with the school staff in ensuring that the lessons prescribed are not neglected. The home lessons are calculated from the capabilities of the average pupil, and parents whose children seem to have either too much or too little work to do at home should communicate with the Rector. In the advanced classes the burden of home work, owing to the increasing demands of the public examinations, is necessarily heavy, but every possible care is taken to ensure that pupils are not injured in health or spirits by over-pressure.

Pupils who neglect to prepare the lessons prescribed for home work, or who for any reason have failed to grasp the instruction given, will be detained for extra instruction after school hours.

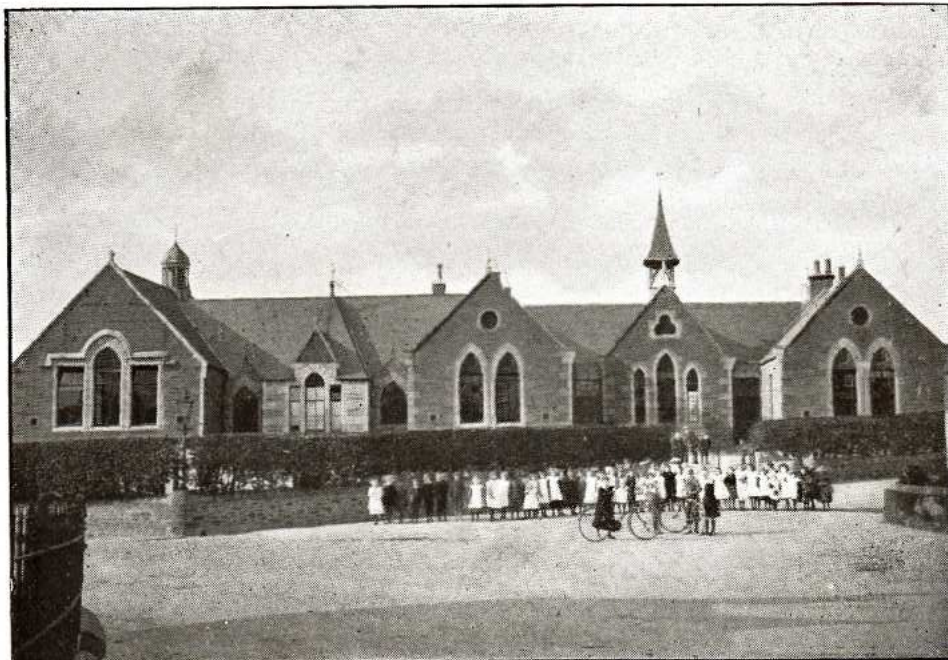
Prizes.—No prize will be awarded to any pupil whose conduct or attendance is unsatisfactory. In particular, no pupil who leaves school before the end of the session or who absents himself from the annual Prize Distribution, unless for acceptable reasons or with permission obtained beforehand from the Rector, will receive a prize. Pupils who are absent from an Examination through illness may receive an average mark at the discretion of the Rector. No prizes will be

awarded in any case where the number of marks gained is an unsatisfactory proportion of the total. Pupils who have attended the school for less than two sessions are, except in the case of the Dr. Grant Gold Medal, not eligible for any of the Medals or Special Prizes. No pupil will be awarded a Medal twice for the same subject. The Rector's decision in all cases will be final.

Religious Instruction.—In the Senior School all classes assemble in the School Hall every morning for a short service of hymn and prayer, conducted by the Rector. Regular instruction in religion and morals is also provided according to a Syllabus adopted by the School Board. Parents who wish their children to be exempted from religious instruction must give written intimation of their desire to the Rector.

School Badge.—All pupils are encouraged, and pupils of Secondary Department are expected, to wear the school cap and badge. The cap, which is to be had in two forms, suitable for girls and boys respectively, is maroon in colour. The badge, which should be worn on the cap, and may in the case of girls be used also as a brooch, bears the motto of the School: "Do ut Des."

Museum and Libraries.—A School Museum is being formed, and pupils are invited to collect and offer to the curators of the collection any interesting or beautiful objects that may attract their notice—for example, leaves, seeds, insects, fossils, shells, or seaweed. Contributions from former pupils of books for the School Libraries or of pictures for the adornment of the School Hall will be especially welcome.

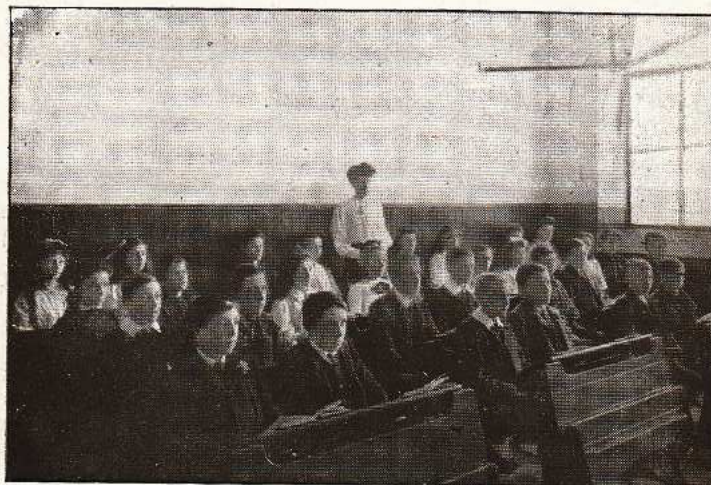

Rector's Report.

To the Members of the School Board of Keith.

GENTLEMEN,

I had the honour in my last two annual Reports to draw attention to the prosperity of the school. During Session 1909-1910 that prosperity has been fairly well maintained.

The general tone throughout the school has been, on the whole, good. The number on the register of each department has not increased, but it has not appreciably diminished. The high record of regularity in attendance, which was one outstanding feature of the two previous sessions, and which in my opinion was the real source of the school prosperity, has not been equalled, and much care will require to be devoted to this question of attendance and general discipline if the whole fabric of prosperity is not to be destroyed. Irregular attendance induces laxity of discipline, loss of interest, lack of co-operation between the pupils and the teaching staff, loss of confidence in the minds of all concerned; and these evils must inevitably destroy the prestige of any school. It cannot be too clearly emphasised that the rules of attendance and discipline have not been relaxed in any particular.

Last session there was again a gratifying increase in the amount of the Government grants earned. In two years the increase has amounted to considerably over £500—that is, to about 30 per cent. of the total grant earned. Unless, however, the utmost care is taken now to check the growing laxity as regards attendance, expansion of grants will have to give way to shrinkage.

Judged by examination tests, the school is in a thoroughly healthy condition. The Leaving Certificate results at the end of last session showed a great advance on those of the previous year, and easily retained the school in its place in the forefront, not only of the Banffshire schools but even of the schools in the three counties favoured by the Dick Bequest.

For the first time since 1904, pupils of Keith Grammar School have obtained places on the Bursary Competition list of Aberdeen University. The success of Miss Jeannie Barclay, who was sixth and highest lady bursar, and of Miss Jeannie Cameron, who, with a year of the school curriculum still to complete, also obtained a satisfactory position on the list, marks the revival of the old honourable and direct connection between this school and our northern University. The

unfortunate limitation of the number of Junior Students, balanced, however, most opportunely by the relaxation of the regulations for the University Bursary Competition, points clearly to the proper path of advance for University students from Keith in future years—by way of the Bursary Competition. The time is now ripe, after the work of the last three sessions, for the school to take once more a leading place in this examination.

I am glad to note the success in Mathematics of Miss Annie Simpson, Fife-Keith, a former Junior Student of the school, whose career will be followed with anticipation. No fewer than twelve former pupils of the school entered the University and the Training Centre last October.

The approaching visit of Dr. George Adam Smith, the Very Reverend Principal of the University, who is coming to distribute the school prizes, will do good in rekindling interest in Keith in University life and work.

The higher education of boys, in particular, requires attention in Keith. Already in two successive Reports I have emphasised the need for continuing the boys longer at school, and indicated the probable causes of their lack of success. The warning needs to be repeated. If the boys of Keith leave school with insufficient education, they must inevitably sink to those levels in which a higher education is not essential, perhaps not even desirable.

With regard to the education of girls, it is worth attention that, while the teaching profession at the present time seems to be in danger of becoming overstocked, there will in all probability in the near future be many lucrative appointments open to ladies qualified in medicine as medical inspectors of schools. This is a new branch of the medical profession, which seems to offer an advantageous outlet for girls of ability, refinement, and education.

I beg to direct attention to the summary of the new arrangements for the University Bursary Competition, given in this issue of the prospectus. The regulations for the Leaving Certificate Examinations and also for the University Preliminary Examinations are at present in course of revision, and the school arrangements will be adapted to suit the new requirements, as soon as these are published.

Attention is requested also to the paragraphs in the School Regulations relating to the Lodgings Register and the Employment Bureau. Employers will do well also to observe the note with regard to the Intermediate Certificate on page 16. A notice with regard to the Continuation Classes will be found at the end of the prospectus, and will repay attention.

Parents of intending pupils, and teachers of schools the pupils of which look naturally to Keith as their centre for obtaining a higher education, should observe the fact that in future years the most convenient time for the enrolment of new

Intermediate and Secondary Department pupils will be immediately after the Easter vacation, not after the summer vacation as in former years. Classes in this school will be re-formed each year in April after the Easter vacation.

The fund for the purchase of school pictures has been practically doubled by the proceeds from the recent concerts, which were successful also from a musical and spectacular point of view. A committee of teachers is considering the purchase of suitable pictures.

The School Libraries have been greatly developed as a result of the sums which you have voted. Much still requires to be done in this direction, but I am confident that the results will justify the outlays involved.

The generosity of Mr. James Coats, Jun., Ferguslie House, Paisley, has provided the scholars with serviceable school bags and satchels, the teachers also receiving handsome and useful gifts. Mr. Coats's kindness is much appreciated by the recipients.

The Ogilvie and Ferguson Bronze Medal is a most welcome addition to the list of annual prizes. Mr. Joseph Herd, jeweller, in making the offer of an annual silver medal, has shown excellent public spirit, and earned the warmest thanks of the school. The other silver medals are provided by your own liberality, and I thank you heartily for the help which your gifts afford.

With regard to prizes, it should be remembered that class prizes are not, as a rule, awarded for excellence in single subjects, but mainly for general proficiency in the whole work of the class.

Staff changes during the present session have been fairly numerous, but it is satisfactory that the teachers who have gone elsewhere have all received good appointments, and that vigour and earnestness continue to be shown by the present teaching staff.

I desire to tender my grateful thanks to all who have contributed to the pleasure and efficiency of my three years' work in Keith. Criticism of my methods there has been, but most people have frankly recognised the difficult nature of the task to which I had to address myself, and in the main their criticism has been just and kind. The regrets of my departure now are mellowed by the remembrance of having had the co-operation, and of retaining still the esteem, of many friends.

KEITH GRAMMAR SCHOOL.

Continuation Classes,**SESSION 1910-1911.**

The special attention of parents, guardians, and employers is directed to the provision made in the Evening Continuation Classes of this school for the further education of the young after they leave the day school. Increased knowledge is the best preparation for honourable and profitable employment, and it is also important that young people should strengthen the habits of study and discipline acquired in the day school by taking advantage of one or other of the courses of study provided in the evening school. The Board is prepared to consider the formation of classes in subjects other than those mentioned in the scheme below if a sufficient number of students make application.

Synopsis of Classes.**(A). ELEMENTARY DIVISION.**

Suitable for pupils (1) who have been exempted from further attendance at the day school, (2) who are under fifteen years of age, (3) whose general elementary education needs strengthening.

The subjects of study in this course are:—English, Geography, Arithmetic, Elementary Science (Boys), and Needlework (Girls).

(B). ADVANCED DIVISION.

I.—COMMERCIAL COURSE.—Suitable for Clerks, Shorthand Writers, etc.

PREPARATORY YEAR.—English, Commercial Geography, Commercial Arithmetic, Duties of Citizenship.

FIRST YEAR.—English, Commercial Correspondence, Précis Writing, Commercial Arithmetic, Shorthand.

SECOND YEAR.—Any two of the following:—English, Commercial Arithmetic, Shorthand, Book-keeping.

THIRD YEAR.—Shorthand, Book-keeping, Principles of Accounting.

II.—BUILDING CONSTRUCTION COURSE.—Suitable for Carpenters, Joiners, Masons, Plumbers, Architects, etc.

PREPARATORY YEAR.—English, Workshop Arithmetic, Free Drawing, Woodwork, Duties of Citizenship.

FIRST YEAR.—Building Drawing (introductory), Practical Mathematics with Laboratory Work.

SECOND YEAR.—Building Construction and Drawing, Applied Mechanics.

THIRD YEAR.—Building Construction, Applied Mechanics, Graphic Statics.

Note.—The Free Drawing will include Brushwork and the use of Water Colours, so as to enable students to tint their drawings in the subsequent parts of the course. The Laboratory Course in connection with the class in Practical Mathematics will consist of experiments performed by the students themselves, and, whenever possible, the substances dealt with will be builders' materials. The course in Applied Mechanics will also be a practical course dealing with forces in connection with levers, the truss roof, wall crane, jib crane, shearlegs, pulley-blocks, screwjack, etc. In the course in Graphic Statics the stresses in the members of roofs and girders of different types will be studied.

III.—HOUSEWIFERY COURSE.—Suitable for Matrons, Young Ladies, Housekeepers, Domestic Servants, etc.

PREPARATORY YEAR.—English, Geography, Arithmetic, one Domestic Subject.

FIRST YEAR.—Cookery, Laundry Work.

SECOND YEAR.—Any two of the following:—Cookery, Laundry Work, Dress-making.

THIRD YEAR.—Household Management, First-Aid, Home Nursing.

IV.—TRADERS' COURSE.—Suitable for Grocers, Bakers, Drapers, Textile Workers, Employees in Shops or Factories, etc.

PREPARATORY YEAR.—English, Commercial Geography, Commercial Arithmetic, Duties of Citizenship.

FIRST YEAR.—Book-keeping, General Elementary Science.

SECOND YEAR.—Book-keeping, Chemistry of Substances important to the individual student.

THIRD YEAR.—Book-keeping, Chemistry—more advanced study of these subjects.

Note.—The Chemistry Course will be practical, and, after the general principles have been studied, each student will study the properties of substances of importance to him in his own employment.

V.—ART COURSE.—Suitable for Painters, Sculptors, Architects, Private Students, etc.

FIRST YEAR.—Drawing from Nature (in pencil, water colour, and crayon) of Leaves, Flowers, Shells, etc., and of Common Objects.

SECOND YEAR.—Drawing from Nature and of Common Objects—more advanced study.

THIRD YEAR.—Studies (in oil and water colours) of Still Life.

Certificates.

Certificates will be issued, subject to the approval of the Scotch Education Department, to all students who have successfully completed any of the above courses of study.

Special Classes.

Special classes are also conducted in Chemistry (for chemists' apprentices, agricultural students, etc.), Ambulance Work (for railwaymen, etc.), Languages, and Music.

Fees.

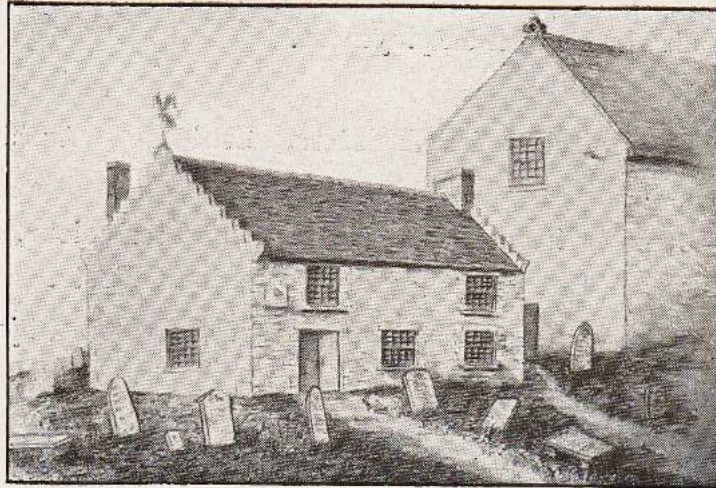
For any Single Course of Study	5/- per session.
For Cookery or Laundry Work	3/6 per session.
For any other Single Subject	5/- per session.

Fees will be returned to all students who have made at least 75 per cent. of

the total attendances, but only on condition that the Headmaster is satisfied that the rules of discipline have been observed.
